CHAIR'S REPORT

Dear Seawinds Community,

I was delighted to take on the position of Chair at the AGM in May as well as continuing to support the Hub as a Volunteer. Today I am pleased to report on our considerable progress over the 2019 year and thank all the people who have contributed to our growth and ongoing success.

Condition of organisation

The Board has continued to maintain close control of the finances throughout the year without compromising our programs and I am pleased to report that the Hub continues to be in a strong financial position at the end of December 2019. The Finance Report will provide more detail.

Initiatives and priorities of the Board and the CEO

The position of CEO was reviewed by the Board and I congratulate Karen Vanderkaay on her appointment as CEO on the 1st July 2019. Karen continues to lead change and steer the organisation on a steady path of improvement and innovation in all areas of our work with the community and the Board maintains its confidence in her positive and can-do attitude.

Our Directors, Jack Carter, Verity Moore, Robert Barnes, and Sinclair Thomas were joined on the Board in August by Amanda Hegarty. Amanda comes with a wealth of experience in training, management and human resources and we value her contribution. One important ongoing priority will be Board training and to kick this off our June meeting was facilitated by Carol Smith (FMPLLEN) who ran a session on Governance and Financials. The Directors of Seawinds have all contributed to the ongoing strategic focus of our organisation and I would like to thank them for their continued work.

Priorities

The Board's focus for 2019 included the following priority areas:

- Increasing utilisation of the Hub through promotion, the expansion of existing programs, and the introduction of new programs, for example the Jacket Learning series and the Dementia Café.
- Increasing workforce engagement and capability through scheduled training sessions, team building activities, and professional development for the paid staff and volunteers.
- Reviewing and updating all policies and procedures including the Staff and Volunteers Code of Conduct, the Parents Handbook, Debt Recovery, Privacy, OH&S and Risk Management.
- Developing a Resource Development Strategy by establishing a Fundraising Committee to include volunteers and a Board member.
- Upgrading our facilities including the security and IT systems.
- Ongoing support for the Capel Sound Children's Project with the No Limits program

Notable events in 2019

Throughout the year we enjoyed our involvement in many fundraising and social events which have helped to bring us closer together as a team but also to expand our reach into the community. The following events come to mind- the Rosebudding Art competition; Neighbour Day and the Men's Shed opening; the first Philosophy café; a Social evening with the staff, the Bunnings BBQ's and Cake stalls; the SPUKES concert supporting the Hub; the Outlet Shopping tour; the Car boot sale; the Barefoot Bowls Xmas breakup, and the Craft XMAS tree. Thank you, all the organisers and supporters.

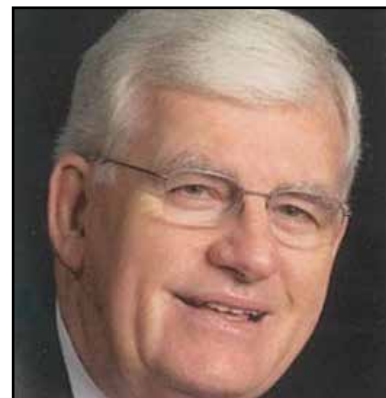

CEO REPORT

Success is the word that comes to mind when I reflect on 2019. It has been a year of growth for Seawinds Community Hub (the Hub), a year of building and rebuilding of relationships, establishing new partnerships, programs and activities that are initiated by and responsive to the local community needs.

It has been an absolute privilege and pleasure to have the opportunity to continue in the role as CEO for Seawinds Community Hub. I have learned so much in this last 12 months, in particular about Resilience. As Jaeda Dewalt said, "When we learn how to become resilient, we learn how to embrace the beautifully broad spectrum of the Human Experience." Which I feel is what happens in practice every day at the Hub. This is reflected in the "vibe" that people comment on when they visit the Hub, it is inclusion in its simplest form and I am grateful to all the Community, Staff, Volunteers and Board members who contribute to making the Hub such a special place for everyone.

This year we have welcomed many more people with varying abilities to the Hub. With the introduction of the NDIS it has enabled people to access community facilities and programs with support, and with them this has brought new talent and opportunity to the Hub by way of the ideas and skills that come with new people. Through these new connections we have developed new partnerships and implemented new programs such as the Umbrella Dementia Café, the Jacket Learning Series, Card Making and Scrap Booking, Gentle Exercise and Happiness First's School Holiday Program.

We have also been able to support new ideas and programs through auspicing arrangements with projects like Uniforms 4 U, an initiative driven by Seawinds Volunteer Collen Mackay, providing uniforms for those vulnerable families in our community, and the Walking Track Feasibility Study which has been spearheaded by passionate local and Capel Sound Community Group Member Terry Wright.

ELC REPORT

In 2019 Seawinds Early Learning Centre has continued to provide a unique play based educational program, that plans for the specific needs of the children and families of our community, utilising the Abecedarian Approach.

We have continued to work in partnership with Eastbourne Primary School, utilising their great facilities, and welcoming the children that read in the ELC. Many thanks to Stephen Wilkinson Principle, Volunteer Roger, Dee and Jade from Eastbourne Primary for their ongoing commitment to supporting the staff and children in our ELC.

The Capel Sound children's project

2019 has been a year of re-establishing relationships and commitment to the CSCP through our involvement with the 'No Limits' project. We are so grateful to have this expert speech therapy program for all 4 year old kindergarten children at Seawinds ELC. The Project gives us access to experts and research as part of a larger project group. It's funded by the Mornington Peninsula Foundation (MPF) and is connecting other kindergartens and feeder primary schools across the Mornington Peninsula.

Through speech assessment and implementation of support programs, our children are receiving individual support in the classroom.

In 2020 MPF will fund an assistant in the classroom to support the implementation of strategies to improve children's speech. This is a great initiative which we are excited to be a partner in.





Seawinds PD Series

The professional development series was again successful in providing access, for teachers and other educators on the peninsula, to inspiring Leaders who shared their expertise in the areas of self-care and early childhood education and development.

The ELC staff continue their commitment to supporting early childhood students from VCAL to Bachelor trained.

The learning goes both ways and the feedback has continued to be positive about the program and approach we use with children in the ELC.

2020 has been particularly challenging for the Team Members in the ELC, with initially low enrolments and then the COVID 19 Pandemic disruptions, they have had to deal with many staffing adjustments. Their cooperation and support of each other has been a great help during this time.

Despite it all, the learning has continued with children, families, teachers, educators, and volunteers creatively adjusting to a different way of delivering programs. Many thanks to all our educators for the positive difference they make in our children's lives.

MEASURING OUR IMPACT



57 volunteers provided 270 volunteer hours of support to the community per week.

Eight of these Volunteers collected food each day for Second Bite. In 2019 the Hub Volunteers redistributed the following food for the community:

- 340 kg of fruit
- 1405 kg of vegetables
- 9091 kg of bread
- 306 kg of meat
- 1044 eggs
- 816 kg of other grocery items

Seawinds Community Hub employs a total of 24 staff:

- 5 Full-time staff
- 7 Part-time staff
- 3 Tutors - casual or sessional
- 8 Casual/ fixed term project staff
- 1 Contractor

1974 people used the Hub in an average week including volunteers, students, children in childcare, people from other organisations who meet at the Hub and use the Café as well as drop-ins

Seawinds Community Hub is open to the public on average 93 hours per week.



In an average month 81 different community groups are supported by Seawinds Community Hub.

51 different community groups use a room in the Hub

21 are supported by the Hub

21 are auspiced by the Hub

In an average month, the Hub works in partnership with 49 different groups

The Hub is represented on 9 external networks

In the Early Learning Centre:

Minnows and Sea Stars ran for a total of 50 weeks

3 YO Kindergarten ran for a total of 40 weeks

4 YO Kindergarten ran for a total of 41 weeks

3 YO kindergarten had an average booking of 19 children, this amounted to 1560 sessions for the year on average.

4 YO kindergarten had an average booking of 30 children, this amounted to 3690 sessions for the year on average.

3 YO Before kinder care had an average booking of 2 children per day, this amounted to 164 sessions for the year on average.

3 YO After kinder care had an average booking of 3 children per day, this amounted to 240 sessions for the year on average.

4 YO Before kinder care had an average booking of 1 child per day, this amounted to 123 sessions for the year on average.

4 YO after kinder care had an average booking of 3 children per day, this amounted to 369 sessions for the year on average.

Minnows had an average booking of 9 children per day, this amounted to 2250 sessions for the year on average.

Sea Stars had an average booking of 6 children per day, this amounted to 1600 sessions for the year on average.

From the children's kitchen, 4746 sessions were served 3 meals a day, this amounts to 14,238 meals approximately served in total for the year.



SEAWIND'S FINANCES

Treasurer's Report

After a successful 2018, the Board kept a number of measures in place to ensure the ongoing financial viability of Seawinds Community Hub in 2019. The Long Day Child Care and the Kindergarten make up the Early Learning Centre (ELC) of Seawinds Community Hub. The start of 2019 was a slow start for the ELC with the number of children attending Long Day Child Care being quite low and continued for the remainder of 2019. This resulted in Long Day Care posting a deficiency of almost \$6000 for the 2019 year, whereas Kinder posted a surplus of just over \$6000.

Community Services and Programs of the Hub also posted a surplus with an increase in room hire, an increase in income for the Seahorse Coffee Shop and other donations. The Hub was well patronised during 2019 with some days during the week at capacity for room bookings. The Hub continues to work with the Mornington Peninsula Shire Council in monitoring its accounts, managing the facility and utilisation of the building.

The overall surplus for Seawinds Community Hub in the Early Learning Centre (Kinder and Day Care) was "breakeven", the Community Services Programs made a \$43K surplus. Most of this was due to a \$21K grant for an upgrade of the IT facilities at the Hub as well as room hire, Seahorse Coffee Shop, class fees and other programs all being over budgeted income for each area. Income for Community programs were \$68K over budget the corresponding expenses were only \$11K over budget for the 2019 year.

Construction of the Men's Shed was completed in 2019. This project has been many years in the making and a committee has now been established to oversee this new piece of infrastructure. The Men's Shed was running for 2019, with fundraisers and projects being completed.

A comprehensive overview of the finances for Seawinds Community Hub is outlined in the Annual Financial Statement.

The Board look forward to another successful year in 2020, but already, with the advent of Coronavirus, we are working in challenging times. We are very mindful of health precautions that are required while the ELC remains open and the finances to ensure that Seawinds remains viable and staff remain employed. The government's announcement of the JobKeeper package certainly helps with payment towards wages of staff.

The Board would like to extend its thanks to Karen and the rest of the staff and volunteers for their support over many years. We are endeavouring to continue to provide a high-quality community service for all the residents of Capel Sound and beyond.

I would sincerely like to thank the many local businesses who have donated a range of items to use in our raffles and as prizes at our events throughout 2019.

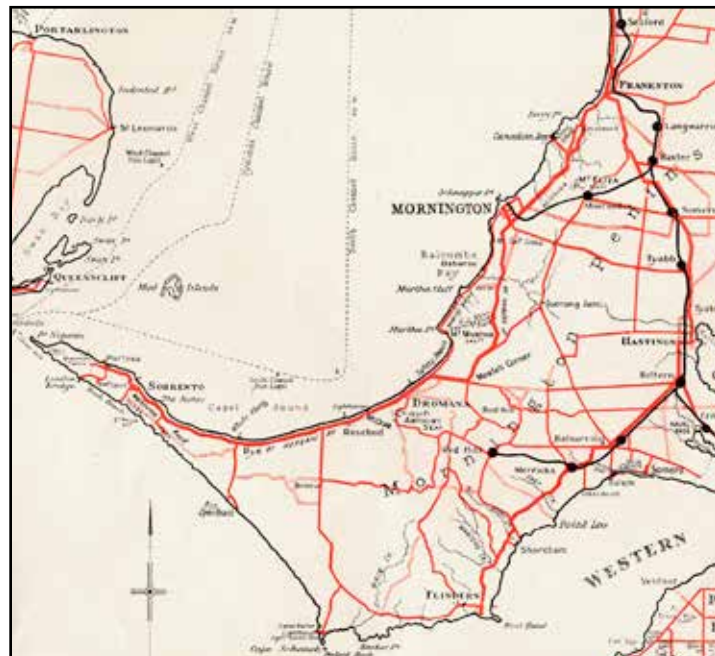
A special thank you to the Team at Eagle Ridge, once again for your generosity in providing the venue for our Annual Golf Day, and the Rosebudding Art Competition.
